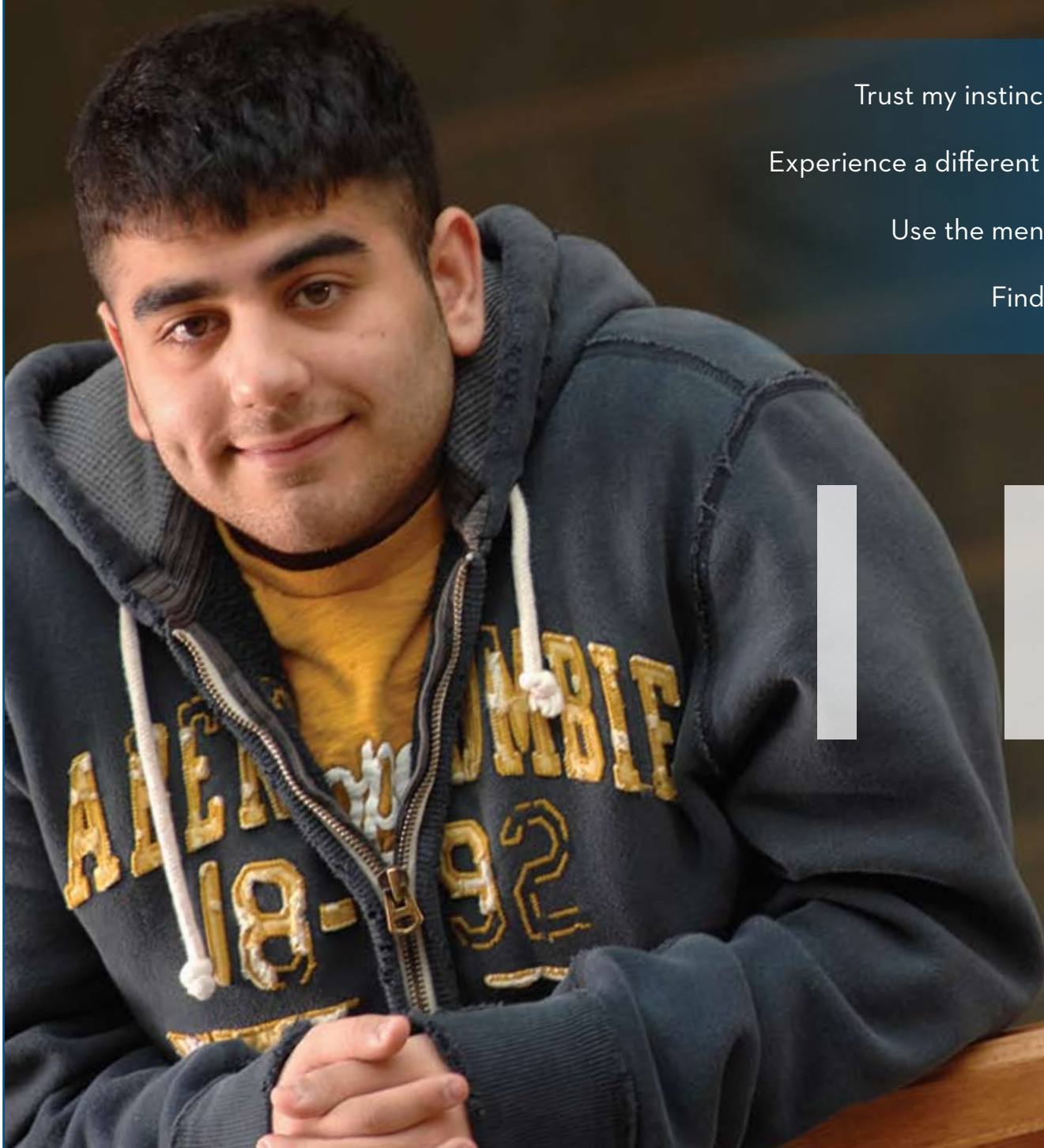

CODE OF CONDUCT

The information contained below is a summary of select policies for John Carroll University students. A complete listing of all policies and procedures can be found on line at: www.jcu.edu/campuslife/deanofstudents/csm/. The Community Standards Manual provides information to students about expectations for their behavior. As members of the University community, students are responsible for becoming familiar with all policies.

INTRODUCTION

As a Jesuit Catholic university, John Carroll inspires individuals to excel in learning, leadership, and service in the region and in the world.

All statements of student rights must be read in light of responsible membership in a university community committed to the above statement.

Please be aware that the provisions of this handbook are not to be regarded as an irrevocable contract between John Carroll University and its students. The University reserves the right to change any provision or any requirement at any time.

STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT

A student enrolling in John Carroll University assumes an obligation to behave in a manner compatible with the University's function as an educational institution. The purpose of the Student Code of Conduct, herein referred to as the Student Code, is to establish the expectations regarding students' behavior and to expand upon the Rights and Responsibilities. These guidelines are not arbitrary legislation but have, as their primary purpose, the welfare of the student and the entire John Carroll community. They have been formulated with the sincere objective of directing and channeling the efforts of John Carroll students toward a successful university life.

The University is dedicated not only to learning and the advancement of knowledge, but also to the whole development of persons within the Jesuit Catholic tradition. The University seeks to achieve those goals through a sound educational program that includes clear policies governing student rights and responsibilities. Since all members of this institution freely affiliate with this University, they make a decision to be bound by the rules, regulations, and principles of the University community.

Certain behaviors are incompatible with the above standards and are unacceptable in the University community. For these reasons, they are subject to disciplinary action by the University. Examples of such behaviors include, but are not limited to, the following: (Students should consult the Undergraduate/Graduate catalogues, the Community Standards Manual, the Residence Life housing contract, Campus Safety Services parking regulations, and other published University policies for a more complete list of rules and regulations.)

1. Disrespect for Oneself

- Violating the University alcohol policy. This includes, but is not limited to, such behaviors as underage students being in the presence of or using alcoholic beverages, or any student being intoxicated. It must be understood that the effects of alcohol do not relieve individuals of their responsibility to themselves and/or the community.
- Possessing, using, distributing, being in the presence of, and/or selling narcotics, drug paraphernalia, other drugs, or any controlled substance illegally.
- Exhibiting reckless actions that endanger the health or safety of any person.
- Engaging in illicit sexual behavior.
- Engaging in policy violations by your guest(s).

2. Disrespect for Others

- Physically or verbally abusing, assaulting, threatening, endangering, or harassing any person either intentionally or recklessly.
- Engaging in harassment based on race, ethnicity, gender, religious affiliation, ability or sexual orientation. (See Sexual Harassment Policy.)
- Engaging in sexual assault, defined as any form of sexual contact with another person without the consent of that person. (See Sexual Misconduct Policy.)
- Participating in hazing or harassment, which includes actions or situations that do or could result in mental, emotional, or physical discomfort; embarrassment; ridicule; or endangerment whether intentionally, for fun, or by consent.
- Misusing or interfering with fire equipment, or failing to follow fire drill or other emergency procedures. This includes tampering with or disregard for security precautions in the residence halls or other facilities on campus.
- Interfering with the safety or health of a member of the University community.

- Possessing, using, or selling firearms, other dangerous weapons, or incendiary or explosive devices including fireworks.
- Engaging in behavior that is disruptive of the living or learning environment on campus.
- Throwing food or engaging in other disruptive behavior in the dining hall, Inn Between or other food service location.
- Participating in lewd or indecent misconduct.

3. Disrespect for Property

- Engaging in the unauthorized entry into, use of, or occupancy of University premises, facilities, or properties.
- Engaging in the theft of, misuse of, damage to, or destruction of institutional, group, or private property, including library materials, computers, or computerized information.
- Engaging in arson or the irresponsible use of fire.
- Possessing property that is not your own, such as room keys or University identifications.

4. Disrespect for Authority

- Intentionally interfering with any normal function of a University sponsored activity.
- Violating published policies and rules governing residence halls, student organizations, and/or the University.
- Engaging in illegal gambling.
- Failing to comply with the directions of University employees acting in the performance of their duties. This includes, but is not limited to, Campus Safety Services personnel, Residence Life staff, or Dining Service staff.
- Engaging in acts or deeds that violate existing federal, state, county, or municipal laws or ordinances.
- Refusing to show or surrender University identification upon request by University employees acting in the performance of their duties.
- Failure to appear before the dean of students or his/her designee.

5. Dishonesty

- Engaging in any form of dishonesty, including cheating, plagiarism, and fabrications, or assisting others to do so. Normally, individual instances of academic cheating or plagiarism are handled by the faculty member and department. (See Academic Honesty Policy.)
- Knowingly furnishing false identification to the University. Misrepresentation of identification about oneself or others when providing information to a University official acting in the performance of his/her duties. This includes possessing identification that falsely gives information about a person such as an altered driver's license.
- Engaging in forgery, alteration, or the unauthorized use of University records, documents, or instruments of identification.
- Misusing financial assistance (aid) through fraud and/or abuse.
- Violating a printed policy issued by academic affairs.

6. Offenses Against the Judicial System

- Not cooperating with any discipline body by not appearing at a hearing, or not being forthcoming and honest with information.
- Not complying with sanctions imposed by a discipline body in a timely manner.
- Violating disciplinary probation.

Alcohol and Illegal Drugs

POLICY

Persons under the age of 21 are not permitted to consume alcohol under any circumstances on University premises or at any University event regardless of where the event takes place.

The University prohibits the illegal use, possession, or distribution of illegal drugs or controlled substances or association with gatherings involving such use, possession, or distribution. Members of the University community are expected to be aware of and obey federal, state, and municipal laws or ordinances regulating the use, possession, or sale of alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs, or controlled substances. Those who are cited for violations of law or ordinances by state, federal, or municipal authorities also may face University disciplinary proceedings and may be required to pursue counseling and participate in an educational program or treatment. The University reserves the right to take disciplinary action against any student for off-campus behavior that violates this policy.

UNIVERSITY REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE USE OF ALCOHOL

Alcoholic beverages are allowed at John Carroll University only as specifically outlined here: (Exceptions may be granted to some parts of this policy by the dean of students or a designee.)

- Resident students and their guests who are 21 or older may consume moderate amounts of alcohol in University residences in the privacy of their rooms and in a manner that recognizes the rights of others. Resident students who are 21 or older may consume alcohol in the presence of an underage roommate as long as no other guests are present. In all other situations, resident students or others under the age of 21 are not allowed to be in the presence of those who are legally consuming or possessing alcohol. No drinking or carrying of open containers of alcohol is allowed in common areas such as hallways, lounges, stairwells, laundry rooms, or bathrooms. Any student who associates with gatherings involving the illegal use of alcohol is in violation of this policy.
- The sale or purchase of any alcoholic beverage in the residence halls is prohibited.
- If recurring patterns of irresponsible behavior by an individual, section, floor or hall should occur, permission to consume alcohol in the residence hall may be revoked by the area coordinator pending further disciplinary action.
- Displays or possession of empty alcohol containers are not allowed in rooms of students who are under the age of 21.
- Funnels, bongs and other devices used for the rapid consumption of alcohol are prohibited.
- Alcoholic beverages are prohibited at University-sponsored athletic events on and off campus.
- Drivers and/or passengers in University vehicles and University-sponsored vehicles may not possess or consume alcohol.
- "Grain" alcohol is prohibited on campus except for supervised laboratory use.
- The presence of quarter- or half-kegs of beer and containers of alcohol larger than one gallon on campus must be approved in writing by the appropriate vice president or a designee for a specific University event.
- Intoxication or alcohol abuse is not a permissible excuse for unlawful behavior or misconduct. Intoxication is prohibited of all students and their guests. Public drunkenness (identified by slurred speech, erratic behavior, or difficulty with physical coordination), disorderly conduct, property destruction, violations of rights of a roommate, intimidation, or other infringements of the rights of others as a result of alcohol use are prohibited.
- Possession or consumption of alcohol by students in academic buildings is prohibited. Open containers of alcohol are prohibited on the campus grounds.

(The appropriate vice president or dean may grant an exception to this policy. Campus Safety Services and the dean of students' office must be notified in advance.)

UNIVERSITY REGULATIONS REGARDING ILLEGAL DRUG USE

The University prohibits the illegal use, possession or distribution of any illegal drug or controlled substance or association with gatherings involving such use, possession, or distribution. Illegal drugs or controlled substances will be considered in one's possession if on one's person, in one's room, in one's car, or in any bag or other item used to carry the drug, etc.

SANCTIONS

- Students found guilty by the John Carroll University Discipline System of violating the policy on alcohol and illegal drugs face penalties that include fines, probation, residence hall dismissal, limitations on activities or access, required counseling or advising, performance of service work or other work detail, required residence in University approved housing as a condition of continued enrollment, suspension, or expulsion. In conjunction with other penalties, students may be required to participate in an alcohol and other drug education course or chemical abuse evaluation.
- Students involved in the use or possession of an illegal drug or controlled substance will be referred to the dean of students or a designee. They will face serious disciplinary sanction such as suspension or expulsion unless there are significant extenuating circumstances.
- Students involved in any way in the distribution or sale of any amount of illegal drugs or controlled substances will be suspended or expelled.
- The University reserves the right to suspend a student from its residence halls for use or possession of an illegal drug or controlled substance at any time during the academic year.

These regulations are in addition to, not substitutes for, criminal sanctions provided for in municipal, state, and federal statutes. When required by law, violations of those statutes will be reported to the appropriate law enforcement agencies.

Hazing Prohibition Policy

It is the policy of John Carroll University that hazing activities of any type are inconsistent with education and are prohibited at all times. No student, including leaders of student organizations, may plan, encourage, or engage in hazing. No student, administrator, faculty member, alumni or other employee of John Carroll University may encourage, permit, condone, or tolerate any hazing activity.

Hazing is defined as doing any act or coercing another person to do any act of initiation into an organization that causes, or creates a risk of causing, psychological or physical harm to any person. Hazing includes actions or situations that could or do result in mental, emotional, or physical discomfort, embarrassment, ridicule, or endangerment whether intentional, for fun, or by consent. Hazing is also coercing another person to violate any University policy. Obvious examples of hazing include but are not limited to: whipping, beating, or branding; forced calisthenics; exposure to weather; forced or required consumption of any food, liquor, beverage, drug, or any substance; any brutal or cruel treatment; and any activity which subjects any student or other person to ridicule, mental stress, or undue physical endurance.

Students, administrators, faculty members, alumni, and all other employees of John Carroll University should be alert to possible situations, circumstances, or events which might include hazing.

If hazing or planned hazing is discovered, involved students will be informed by the discovering person of the prohibition contained in this policy and will be required to end all hazing activities immediately. All hazing activities will be reported immediately to the dean of students and the director of student activities.

Students violate this policy if they do not report incidents of hazing or potential hazing to the director of student activities or the dean of students. Administrators, faculty members, students, and all other employees who fail to abide by this policy may be subject to disciplinary action and may be liable for civil and criminal penalties in accordance with federal, state, and municipal laws.

Copyright Issues

Copyright is a form of protection provided by law to authors of "original works of authorship" for intellectual works that are "fixed in any tangible medium of expression," both published and unpublished (Title 17, United States Code). It is illegal to violate any of the rights provided by the law to the owner of a copyright. John Carroll University respects the ownership of intellectual material governed by copyright laws.

All members of the University community must comply with the copyright laws and the provisions of licensing agreements that apply to: software; printed and electronic materials, including documentation; graphics; photographs; multimedia, including musical works, video productions, sound recordings, and dramatic works; and all other technological resources licensed and/or purchased by the University or accessible over network resources provided by the University. Individual author, publisher, patent holder, and manufacturer agreements should be reviewed for specific stipulations.

All technological and information resources developed by University employees, students, and contractors for use by the University, or as part of their normal employment activities, are considered "works for hire." As such, the University is considered the "author" and owner of these resources. (For information regarding the ownership of technological resources developed with grant funding, contact the associate academic vice president.)

*Students should be aware that it is illegal to download music and movies and share files without paying for the product. As of July 1, 2005 John Carroll University received a subpoena requiring the University to identify two students for possible criminal charges regarding their alleged involvement in illegal file sharing.

Off-Campus Behavior Policy

The University reserves the right to review student misconduct that occurs off-campus when such behavior reflects upon the integrity of the University. Students are reminded that they serve as representatives of John Carroll University and both positive and inappropriate behavior affect the University image and reputation.

Students are encouraged to be involved in their community in positive ways, such as community service and local government. The University desires to have students act as both responsible and mature representatives.

In the cases of inappropriate behavior off-campus, the dean of students or his/her designee investigates these charges and may make referrals to the Discipline System.

SEXUAL MISCONDUCT GENERAL STATEMENTS

A. Policy

John Carroll University seeks to provide the kind of community for students, faculty, and staff that promotes personal growth and development. The University asserts that respect for the rights and dignity of all people must be protected to achieve such goals. These goals are an integral part of all aspects of University life, rooted in its Catholic and Ignatian identity, and they are part of the essence of a learning environment and academic community with a distinctive educational mission.

It is the policy of John Carroll University, consistent with the aforementioned beliefs and values, that sexual assault of another person is illegal, unacceptable, and will not be tolerated. The Sex Offense Policy covers violations committed by members of the John Carroll University community. It also addresses procedures for the safety and support of victims of a sex offense.

All members of the University community should be aware of both the consequences of sex offenses and the options available to victims. The University urges victims to seek assistance from any of the available on-campus or off-campus resources.

The University reserves the right to pursue disciplinary action for sex offenses against members without regard to prosecution by criminal justice authorities.

B. Sex Offenses Defined

The John Carroll University Sex Offense Policy includes Sexual Assault, Non-Consensual Sexual Contact, and Sexual Exploitation.

Sexual Assault is engaging in, or attempting to engage in, oral, vaginal, or anal penetration through any means (i.e. penis, tongue, finger, foreign object, etc.) without the consent (see below) of the other person.

Non-Consensual Sexual Contact includes any sexual touching of any sexual body parts (i.e. breasts, buttocks, groin, genitals, mouth, etc.) or the touching of another with these body parts without consent. It also includes disrobing or exposure without consent.

Sexual Exploitation involves a person who, for purposes of sexual gratification, engages in activity involving another person who has not consented to such activity. Examples of sexual exploitation include, but are not limited to: the recording and/or transmitting of sexual activity, complicity in voyeurism, the knowing transmission of HIV or a STI, and inducing incapacitation with the intent to take sexual advantage of another (whether or not sexual activity actually takes place).

Sexual Assault and Non-Consensual Contact can be committed by a man, woman, or group against a person or persons with the same or opposite sex. It can also be committed by current or former lovers, friends, and acquaintances.

Whether or not a person consents to a sexual activity will be judged based on all of the facts and circumstances. If a person has any doubt as to whether another person consents to the activity, it is important to take appropriate steps to resolve that doubt. The potential personal and/or legal consequences to either party resulting from an ambiguous encounter are too great to allow for the possibility of a misunderstanding. You should also be particularly mindful of the following:

- Consent is not necessarily inferred from a person's silence or lack of resistance.
- Consent can not be present if the sexual activity results from any threat of force, harm, intimidation, or coercion.
- Under Ohio law, a person's age might determine whether or not the activity is lawful, regardless of whether the person actually consents to it.
- Past consent to sexual activity does not imply future ongoing consent, and the fact that two persons are in an ongoing relationship shall not preclude the possibility that a sexual assault might occur within that relationship.
- A violation of the law can be found if a person is aware or should be aware that the other person is unable to consent or resist because the other person is substantially impaired due to a physical or mental condition, whether temporary or permanent, which could include the other person's intoxication and/or incapacity caused by the use of drugs or alcohol.
- A person violated the law when purposely giving another person a drug or intoxicant in order to impair the other person's ability to resist or give consent. Please note: The State of Ohio has clearly defined criminal sex offense statutes in Chapter 2907 of the Ohio Revised Code. Under federal law, the University must maintain and report campus crime statistics using the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program. UCR categorizes sex offenses as forcible or non-forcible. Regardless of their categorization under criminal law, sex offenses are serious crimes. John Carroll University community members may face criminal prosecution in addition to University disciplinary proceedings.

Intersection of Sexual Harassment Policy

John Carroll University has a separate policy and procedures governing sexual harassment which provides both informal and formal resolution of sexual harassment claims. Some sexual harassment claims may also involve sexual misconduct claims. In general, however, serious sexual misconduct allegations such as sexual assault and rape will be handled under the sex offense policy rather than the sexual harassment policy.

Smoke-Free Campus Policy

John Carroll University is committed to providing a healthy, comfortable, and productive environment for the students, faculty, staff, and administration of this campus.

The United States Surgeon General in his 1986 report on Involuntary Smoking concluded: Involuntary smoking is a cause of disease, including lung cancer, in healthy nonsmokers; and the simple separation of smokers and nonsmokers within the same air space may reduce, but does not eliminate, the exposure of nonsmokers to environmental tobacco smoke.

The Environmental Protection Agency has classified smoke as a Group A carcinogen, a substance known to cause cancer in humans. The EPA does not recognize a safe level of exposure to Group A carcinogens.

In light of these findings, John Carroll University reconfirms its Smoking Policy (established August 1995) and issues this Smoke-free Campus Policy.

- Smoking is prohibited in all buildings on campus.
- Private residential space within University housing will be covered under separate regulations (see Residence Life Smoking Policy).
- Please note that there are no designated smoking areas in any building on campus. Those who choose to smoke should do so outdoors.

John Carroll acknowledges the harmful effects of second-hand smoke and has decided to make one entrance smoke-free (25-50 feet) at every building on campus. This entrance can be used by anyone, but provides a way for people to enter a building without breathing in harmful cancer causing carcinogens.

Residence Life Policies

FIRE SAFETY

Causing a building to go into alarm falsely can carry grave consequences. Students may panic or may ignore the alarm believing it to be false. This may, in turn, cause students to become injured, overcome by smoke, or to lose their lives. Therefore, the University takes the actions of tampering with fire alarms, smoke detectors, sprinklers, and fire extinguishers which trigger an alarm very seriously.

The following will be considered as sufficient cause for immediate expulsion from the University:

- Intentionally setting a fire of any nature.

The following will be considered as sufficient cause for immediate suspension from the University:

- Pulling a fire alarm when no danger is present.
- The following will be considered sufficient for immediate removal from the residence halls for a designated period of time:
- Tampering with or discharging a fire extinguisher with no danger present.

Other violations, including tampering with smoke detectors and failing to evacuate during a fire alarm, carry a variety of sanctions as well.

GUEST POLICY

Access to the residence halls at John Carroll University is only permitted to students who reside in each specific hall, guests of the halls' residents (including other JCU students who do not reside in that building), University employees, or outside employees given permission to work in the residential facilities. Resident students are responsible for the behaviors and actions of their guests. Guests must be escorted by their host residents while in the residence halls. Further, residents may not allow other individuals to have access to their residence hall keys at any time.
