

The following alumni have been chosen to receive John Carroll's highest honor: the Alumni Medal. Recipients will be honored at the annual Alumni Awards Dinner on Saturday, September 30, 2023 as a part of Homecoming and Family Weekend.

#### James A. Covne '82

Known among his classmates for his smile, leadership on the football and rugby fields, and for being a dedicated member of the John Carroll community. A Finance major with a distinguished career in the financial industry where he is currently active in more than 20 organizations connected with his firm, Stoneleigh Capital, where he is a Partner. A Chicago native who calls the New York City-area home, Jim has served on John Carroll's Board of Directors since 2014 as a member of the Finance Committee. He has been a passionate advocate for the University's enrollment efforts in New York and Chicago for decades, regularly hosting alumni and recruitment events with his wife Diana in the New York City-area, and previously created the Fenwick Scholarship Fund to support students from his high school matriculating to JCU. # ALEX PHILLIP '23: THE G.O.A.T

Without a doubt, Alex Phillip enjoyed one of the most storied careers in the 100-plus-year history of athletics at John Carroll University.

Phillip concluded his trophy-filled career at the 2023 NCAA Division III Outdoor Track & Field Championships. The Akron native won the 5000m and the 10000m, steering the Blue Streaks to a tie for third place as a team. It was a fitting end to what has been an incredible four years.

Prior to JCU, Phillip had high hopes of becoming a collegiate national champion. But in high school, he was known as much for his soccer skills as for his running. Enter Kyle Basista.

As JCU's Cross Country and Track & Field head coach, Basista mentored Phillip on and off the course. And Phillip developed into one of the nation's best runners, now bound to run at the Division I level at the University of North Carolina.

As he departs for Chapel Hill, Phillip stands as a 13-time All-American, seven-time National Champion, and three-time National Runner-Up. At the Ohio Athletic Conference level, Phillip finishes with 16 OAC titles and six OAC records. At the JCU level, Phillip holds

eight school records (1,500, Mile, DMR, 3K, indoor and outdoor 5K, 10K, 8K XC). His distance double at the NCAA Outdoor Championships finalized his amazing legacy.

"Alex is a great ambassador for the University. He embodies everything you want a student-athlete to be and he has raised the standard of our program," says Basista. "I'm still not sure if any of us have fully grasped what he was able to do in the Blue & Gold uniform, but regardless, we just enjoyed watching him everyday in the constant pursuit of excellence."

Phillip, who graduated in May with a 3.24 GPA as a Finance major, will always be proud to call John Carroll home.

"As I've had more time to reflect on my time at JCU, it means a lot. I never thought I would be able to accomplish all I did. I never thought I'd be in a position to be competing for National Championships," says Phillip "I wholeheartedly believe Kyle Basista is one of the best coaches in the country with the results to prove it. John Carroll is the best decision I've ever made. If you want to have a well-rounded approach to school, athletics, and work to set yourself up for success on the course and in your life, this is the place you want to be."

#### **TAKING HOME HARDWARE**

The Blue Streaks finished tied for 28<sup>th</sup> place in the Learfield Directors Cup, the prestigious cup created by NCAA athletic directors to recognize collective success by schools in intercollegiate athletics. Additionally, John Carroll claimed the OAC Men's All-Sports Trophy for a record eighth straight year.

#### **BASEBALL MAKES HISTORY**

As the number four seed in the Ohio Athletic Conference Tournament, the Blue Streaks played the spoiler. Bobby Bell's Blue Streaks roared to take the OAC crown for just the second time in program history. John Carroll punched a ticket to the NCAA Tournament for a third time. Following the season, star infielder **Joe Olsavsky** became the program's first player to sign an MLB contract, as Olsavsky ioined the Atlanta Braves.

#### WELCOMING A NEW ATHLETICS LEADER: **BRIAN POLIAN '97**

In May, John Carroll Athletics welcomed a new leader: Brian Polian '97. John Carroll's new Director of Athletics is no stranger to University Heights, having played football during a successful era in the 1990s Polian carries more than 25 years of Division I football coaching experience, including stops at the University of Notre Dame, Louisiana State. Nevada. Texas A&M, and Stanford.

U.S. healthcare is at an inflection point, impacted by the global pandemic and an ongoing awareness of the social determinants of health and healthcare inequities. More healthcare systems are exploring how to deliver healthcare in community-based settings and at home, and focusing on preventative care and post-acute management.

Critical to meeting these sweeping changes are nurses, who provide vital healthcare services from hospitals to communitybased clinics to patients' homes.

"Nursing is the largest sector of healthcare professions," says Dr. Melissa Cole, DNP, RN, ANP-BC, CENP, and John Carroll's Inaugural Director of Nursing & Strategic Healthcare Integration. "Without it, healthcare crumbles. With it, it soars." Before accepting this new role, Dr. Cole was the Vice President for Integrated Delivery Options at University Hospitals Health System and still currently practices as a Nurse Practitioner of Emergency Medicine.

"The opportunity to start a brand-new nursing program that would impact the future of healthcare was very appealing to me," says Cole. "It was a chance to design a program that would prepare future nurses for a very different healthcare structure."

#### **CRITICAL TIMING**

In 2021, the National Academy of Medicine released its report on the future of nursing, a survey produced every ten years that serves as a blueprint of best practices for the nursing profession. Its findings predict that the next ten years will require strong, diversified nurses that are "prepared to provide care; promote health and well-being among nurses, individuals, and communities; and address the systemic inequities that have fueled wide and persistent health disparities."

In 2022, the American Association of Colleges of Nursing significantly revised its quality standards to redefine nursing education with new, rigorous curriculum guidelines. "The Essentials: Core Competencies for Professional Nursing

Education" incorporates holistic patient care using a competencybased approach, rather than just skills-based nursing, and includes a new focus on nurses' self-care and resiliency.

The timing of these two groundbreaking reports on nursing and nursing education complemented John Carroll's strategy for its new nursing program. "The new Essentials align very easily with our mission and vision for the nursing program," says Dr. Shanna Botos '00, the Medical Mutual Assistant Professor of Nursing. "We've incorporated the Essentials from the start, as we worked on curriculum mapping and development, and they fit perfectly with our conceptual framework."

That framework is based around a Jesuit core of magis, cura personalis, and acting as a person for and with others. Active learning, experiential learning, problem solving, and reflective practice drive the new nursing program in order to transform, innovate, and inspire both student nurses and their impact on the healthcare system.

The nursing curriculum includes ten learning goals influenced by the Essentials and the Future

of Nursing reports: Nursing as Scientific Discipline, Holistic Care, Diversity, Equity, Population Health, Technology & Informatics, Professional Development, Resiliency, Interprofessional Collaboration & Team Dynamics, and Entrepreneurship. The fouryear Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) curriculum ranges from 13 to 17 annual credit hours, and students begin their clinicals during their first year.

### THE JOHN CARROLL DIFFERENCE

Going above and beyond is a hallmark of a John Carroll education, and the new nursing program reflects this with a set of four certificates awarded to each student upon graduation. These certificates show proficiency in professional development, self-care, innovation and entrepreneurship, and diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging (DEIB).

"The certificates leverage a lot of expertise within the University and across our healthcare partnerships to give students experience," notes Cole. The nursing program will collaborate with the Boler College of Business in the areas

of professional development and innovation and entrepreneurship; John Carroll's Counseling Department will assist with self-care and resiliency; and the University's Center for Student Diversity & Inclusion will supply DEIB education and training. All nursing certificate work is interwoven into the curriculum, seamlessly delivering these value-added credentials to students.

The nursing curriculum and its additional certificates rest on John Carroll's foundation of rigorous liberal arts education in the Jesuit Catholic tradition. According to the American Association of Colleges of Nursing, a liberal arts education provides the broad worldview and critical thinking skills necessary to form a nursing student's clinical reasoning and judgement.

In addition to John Carroll's additional certifications, Dr. Cole and Dr. Botos are still practicing clinicians—in the emergency department and pediatrics—which also sets John

Carroll's BSN program apart. It's an opportunity that brings valuable, relevant clinical expertise into the classroom.

#### COMMUNITY-WIDE ENGAGEMENT

The BSN program also leverages resources outside John Carroll in a thoughtful, intentional mix. Northeast Ohio is home to some of the best healthcare facilities in the world, with three major healthcare systems providing cutting-edge care and research—The Cleveland Clinic, University Hospitals, and MetroHealth—as well as numerous community-based healthcare resources.

John Carroll has affiliation agreements with all three anchoring healthcare institutions for students to participate in clinical rotations. BSN students will also have clinical opportunities at New Directions and Crossroads Health, recovery

Coast and Highland Springs, offering behavioral health services; Jennings, a Catholic organization delivering healthcare options for those who are aging; and the Richmond City School System. In collaboration with John Carroll's Center for Service Learning and Social Action, nursing students will provide nutrition and dietary education-foundational to health and wellness-to CSLSA's community partners as their first clinical placement. Lisa Sugar, the program's Nursing Coordinator, will oversee all clinical assignments.

The nursing program will also collaborate with professional nursing organizations in the region. The Cleveland Council of Black Nurses, a leader in advocacy and promoting health equity for over 50 years, will hold their meetings and workshops on John Carroll's campus, and offer experienced nurse-mentors to nursing students. A similar partnership agreement has just been made with the Philippine Nurses Association of Ohio.

#### LEADING-EDGE LABS

At the heart of students' practical preparation for clinical work are two new nursing labs. The low fidelity skills lab is open to students 24/7, and has a flexible classroom configuration accommodating up to 24 people. Moveable tables, chairs, smart boards, and white boards can be arranged as needed; ten bed bays feature actual hospital beds, wall plates with oxygen and pressure gauges, IV poles, and other clinical equipment. Four low fidelity manikins allow students to listen to heart and lung sounds, take blood pressure readings, and insert nasogastric tubes and catheters as they learn the skills needed to be a well-versed nurse.

"The point of a skills lab is to let students make mistakes without hurting anyone," says Botos. "It's a critical place to incorporate teamwork, as faculty and staff work together to learn safe ways to work."

The low fidelity lab is currently set up as a hospital setting; future plans contingent on funding call for one bay to be configured as an outpatient office and another to reproduce a homecare setting, giving students different healthcare settings in which to practice.

The high fidelity lab offers two complete suites that will be open to coursework for all John Carroll's pre-health majors, not just nursing students. "Nursing is bringing interprofessional education to John Carroll," says Botos. "Pre-med, prepharmacy, and exercise science students will be able to utilize this space, too. The high fidelity labs will allow these programs to work together and share resources in a new way."

Each high fidelity lab suite contains a student locker room, acute care space, and debriefing conference room. From a center control room, faculty create simulations of medical situations from a computer, changing inputs in real-time to each manikin in the adjacent room. All simulations are recorded. Two-way glass lets faculty oversee students without being in the room, which encourages students to problemsolve as a group. Depending on the actions taken by students, faculty can change the parameters of each simulation from the control room. All rooms are equipped with

audio visual capabilities; after each simulation, faculty and students review the outcome in the debriefing room.

One lab is configured as a mother/ baby suite, with a manikin who can give birth and simulate obstetric emergencies. Working with an infant manikin (who also cries), students will experience giving infant and neonatal ICU care. The other lab may be arranged for a variety of hospital departments, from ICU and step-down units to a regular care floor. An older male manikin and pediatric female manikin give students a chance to practice skills like intubation, inserting chest tubes, taking advanced vital signs, and working with equipment like a ventilator.

"This is next-level learning," says Botos. "Usually, a nursing student doesn't get to do everything in a clinical setting. Here, we can play out all scenarios without hurting anyone."

### **HEALTHY SUPPORT**

The Nader Family Foundation provided the lead gift to build the amazing high fidelity labs. Tony ('85) and Annette ('86) Nader are both alumni of the Boler College of Business; Tony worked in healthcare and has served on the board of Inova, the largest healthcare provider in Northern Virginia, for 14 years, while Annette worked as a financial analyst in the Washington, D.C. area.

"The nursing program was the missing piece for John Carroll," says Annette. "It's a great opportunity for the school, and it was a no-brainer for us to be helpful to them in their strategic plan."

"We recognize first-hand the incredible work that nurses do in all kinds of clinical settings," says Tony. "Having a state-of-the-art facility in which to practice is important to create leading-edge nurse practitioners."

For alumna Carol Simon '78 (who serves on the John Carroll University Board of Directors) and her husband Frank Lerman, supporting the

new nursing program was a dual opportunity. Simon is an economist for a healthcare consulting firm and sees the need for nursing education with a broad sense of vision. She was also a first-generation college student, attending John Carroll through its scholarship support.

"If I hadn't been offered a scholarship, I wouldn't have been at JCU," says Simon. "I now have the ability to help someone else. John Carroll's nursing program will draw on a Jesuit tradition of strong problem solving. Increasingly, nursing is not just about delivering pieces of clinical care. It's about bringing problem solving and ethics to the bedside, and helping patients get better health outcomes."

Simon's scholarship support is named for her daughter, Paula Lerman, who passed away in 2021 after a lifetime of serious medical issues. "She spent a lot of time in the healthcare system," says Simon, "and nurses were always her favorite people."

A 30-year shared community vision of promoting well-being, personal and economic growth, and the ability to do more for others led Medical Mutual to fund a named professorship in nursing. "As the projected growth of nursing positions continues to increase year over year, the team at JCU is helping to answer the demand," says Jonathon Fauvie, CNP, MPH, Senior Community Affairs at Medical Mutual. "Creating a permanent professorship helps to elevate any academic program. lasts decades into the future."

Strategic planning for the nursing program began several years ago; the program received approval from the Ohio Board of Nursing, the Ohio Department of Education, and the Higher Learning Commission by spring 2022. But the majority of program design, curriculum development, lab construction, and student outreach and enrollment have been proceeding at a ferocious pace for less than one year. Next on tap: accreditation from the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education, a two- to three-year process.

This fall, 13 nursing students enter the program as sophomores, having fulfilled their first-year requirements as pre-health majors. Next year's class will include 24 pre-nursing students who are incoming freshman this year; other students are anticipated to enroll from other pre-health majors.

The first nursing cohort is willing to go the extra mile and take a leap of faith in John Carroll's new nursing program. For Sarah Dailey '26, the excitement of the new program also lies in the fact that she and her fellow students have been involved in the planning of the program from the beginning, from designing the program logo and choosing uniform scrubs to offering input on curriculum. "It is such a privilege to be a part of this first cohort. We are helping design not only our future, but the future of the rest of the classes who go through this program."

We are truly grateful to Tony '85 and Annette '86 (Ryall) Nader, Carol Simon '78 and Frank Lerman, and Medical Mutual for their groundbreaking support of our Nursing program and our investment in our healthcare programs. As one of John Carroll's greatest and most consistent benefactors, Joe supported every capital campaign since the 1980s, including the Corbo Fitness Room, Dolan Science Center, Don Shula Stadium, and Short Family Tennis Center. His love of athletics led him to make consequential gifts to John Carroll's football, men's basketball, women's basketball, volleyball and men's and women's tennis teams. At the same time, he believed deeply in the power of John Carroll's Jesuit Catholic education, and gave scholarship funding that provided aid to students in need. And Joe made a gift to John Carroll through his estate to create the Tetlak Diocesan Scholarship Fund, to help students from high schools in the Cleveland diocese attend John Carroll.

"Joe was a behind-the-scenes kind of guy," says Mike Moran, longtime friend of Joe's and Former Hall of Fame Men's Basketball Coach and current Men's Golf Coach. "Joe was win-or-lose loyal. He was happy when we won, but he was mainly concerned that athletes had a good experience. He was happy to see a young person become a success."

Joe grew up in Detroit, Michigan, but followed in his father's footsteps to attend John Carroll. A chance meeting on an Acapulco beach with an Ohio businessman resulted in Joe returning to Cleveland and working at Willow Hill Industries in Willowick. Joe eventually bought the company and ran it successfully.

"He was a pretty amazing person," says nephew Patrick Monahan. "My Uncle Joe was very driven when he was working. He did everything he could to make his company as great as possible; he did that with a lot of aspects of his life."

Joe also believed that if he had the means to do something, he had the responsibility to do it. His gift for business allowed him to help others. whether that was helping spot future Heisman trophy winners on the fields of St. Joseph High School and connecting them with University of Michigan coaching staff, insisting that John Carroll's Corbo Fitness Center be open to all students (rather than just athletes), or quietly ensuring that over 30 students got the scholarship funds they needed to attend John Carroll. Joe helped John Carroll students find summer jobs, kept in touch as they went onto often stellar athletic careers, and had strong friendships with John Carroll coaches and leaders.

Joe never married, and considered John Carroll's coaches, student-athletes, and leadership part of his extended family. He was an old school. three-hour-lunch kind of guy, according to those who knew him well. "My Uncle Joe loved to go to lunch and talk," remembers


archaeological sites, restaurants, and beach stops when possible. I cannot wait to hear more about his experience (and see some more pictures)!

This past year, the Class of 1983 saw an opportunity to ensure JCU remains an inviting place for generations to come by creating the Campus Beautification Fund.

Lisa (Amato) Reid summed up a commonly held feeling about the University, saying, "John Carroll University's bucolic campus is a literal oasis within the bustling outer ring of University Heights."

Bill Donnelly, Chairman of JCU's Board of Directors, started by inviting landscape architect Jayson DeGreeter to JCU. "Our campus can be an important strategic asset," he said. "But we needed a vision for the future, and we needed a plan to invest in it."

DeGreeter spent time walking the grounds and interviewing faculty, staff, and board members. He observed how students used the space and reflected on how to improve the campus. "It's obvious the campus is a special place for alumni and students," he said. "I felt a great responsibility to deliver a plan that presents how to tend to this campus appropriately for today's students and for the next generation."

An equally important step for the future was securing funding. With the Class of '83's 40th reunion coming up, Donnelly turned to his former roommate Tom Burke to lead the reunion class gift. "I was happy to take on the role, but I needed a purpose the class could rally around," Burke said. "Campus beautification was the perfect focus."

Burke reached out to classmate Jim Brown. "I remember my mom saying if the school is this intent on keeping up the grounds, I bet they're just as focused on educating their students. told Tom to sign me up. I was ready to help," he said.

Burke enlisted Class of '83 volunteers to assist in fundraising and match donations. He also orchestrated a big push for participation around JCU's Giving Day in April.

"Tom was a master at getting our class rallied around this opportunity," said Sandra Ryan. "With the Campus Beautification Fund, we found a way to impact the greatest number of people at the University."

To date, the fund has grown to \$130,000. As an endowment, the assets can be invested with the proceeds available to fund future projects.

Jeremiah Swetel, Assistant Vice President of Facilities and Auxiliary Services, commented that the University is fortunate to have the Class of 1983 take on this project. "It's important to sustain the beautiful aesthetics of the campus," he said. "An endowment like this lets us maintain and improve our campus, allowing our operating budget to focus on educating students."

Burke wants to offer every 40-year reunion class the opportunity to make the Campus Beautification Fund the focus of its reunion gift, though everyone is welcome to contribute. "We all thought this campus was beautiful when we first visited 45 years ago," he said. "It's beautiful today and if we stick to the plan, it will be beautiful 100 years from now."
