


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



JCU JOINS THE NCAC

A NEW ERA FOR JOHN CARROLL ATHLETICS

Beginning in the fall of 2025, John Carroll University will become a member of the North Coast Athletic Conference (NCAC). Membership in the prestigious NCAC aligns with John Carroll's nationally competitive athletic programs and other liberal arts colleges and universities that share a focus on rigorous academics and highlevel athletic programs. The Blue Streaks will become the tenth member of the Conference which includes institutions from Ohio and Indiana that serve students beyond the Midwest.

Miciak, Ph.D., John Carroll University President. Brian Polian '97, JCU's Athletic Director and a former student-athlete, added: "At John Carroll, students can pursue excellence in the classroom and on the playing field without sacrificing one for the other. We believe this announcement aligns John Carroll with peer institutions that share a common mission, and that attract students from across the country."

JCU will depart the Ohio Athletic Conference after being a member since the 1989-1990 academic year, as well as from 1932-1949. In between, JCU was a founding member of the Presidents Athletic Conference (PAC) in 1955, competing for 34 years in the PAC. JCU leaves the OAC having captured 190 conference championships (men's & women's). John Carroll has also won 12 OAC Men's All-Sports Trophies, including each of the last eight.

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MEN'S BASKETBALL RANKED #1 FOR FIRST TIME IN SCHOOL HISTORY

For most of December and February, the John Carroll Men's Basketball team was ranked #1 in the nation for Division III by D3Hoops.com. The men's cagers entered the month of February undefeated in OAC regular season play (14-0), highlighted by a dominant 96-61 victory over Mount Union before a packed DeCarlo Varsity Center in January.

For the third consecutive year, both Men's and Women's Cross Country teams won the OAC Championships respectively. Coach Kyle Basista and his staff were awarded the Men's & Women's Coaching Staff of the Year award for the fourth season in a row, while sophomore Ian Paul won the OAC Rookie of the Year honor.

OAC Coach of the Year Mike Marich's team captured both the OAC Regular Season and OAC Tournament Championship en route to the best season in school history. The squad knocked out #8 Case Western Reserve University and #14 M.I.T. on their way to the Elite 8 for the first time ever. The team posted a 16-2-5 record and had six players achieve All-OAC status, including OAC Goalkeeper of the Year and Freshman of the Year Madeline Martin Kosier.







JOHN CARROLL'S **NEW**

Taking *Cura Personalis* to Another Level

For 138 years, John Carroll University has offered Jesuit Catholic education through its College of Arts and Sciences and the Boler College of Business. Now, after thoughtful examination and rigorous innovation, the University announces the creation of its new College of Health. Over the past four years, faculty and alumni, alongside university and board leadership, have imagined and designed the next critical step in cultivating *Inspired Futures* through a College of Health.

The bedrock of this new endeavor is the Jesuit commitment to *cura personalis*, care of the whole person, and the Ignation tradition of service to others. This mission will help develop healthcare practitioners and leaders who are holistically trained in comprehensive care, aware of the intersection of mental and physical health, and—as students of a Jesuit liberal arts university—innovative, compassionate, critical thinkers.

Deliberate Creation

"Creating the nursing program was a necessary and critical first step; one that aligned with our Jesuit mission and capitalized on the national reach of the world-class healthcare providers in Northeast Ohio," says Alan R. Miciak, Ph.D., John Carroll University President.

"It was clear that a nursing program, embedded in a College of Health, was a prime opportunity for us, both philosophically and practically," says Bonnie Gunzenhauser, Ph.D., Vice President for Academic Affairs. "This is a significant event: we are planting a flag that healthcare is integral to John Carroll's future and our Jesuit mission, while also addressing a significant societal need."

The John Carroll Board of Directors created a Healthcare Committee within the Board that brought together alumni with experience in healthcare—on both the business and clinical sides—to advise John Carroll of the best way to launch a College of Health, based on its tradition of Jesuit service with sensitivity to the needs of the current healthcare market. The Co-Chairs of the Healthcare Committee are Dr. Eric Beck, D.O., M.P.H, '04, CEO of ESO Solutions, Inc. and Annmarie Lyons '95, Vice President of Women's Health Services at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center.

In addition to alumni expertise, the Healthcare Committee strengthened relationships with the three world-class healthcare systems in Cleveland—The Cleveland Clinic, MetroHealth, and University Hospitals—and numerous

community-based health organizations ranging from recovery and behavioral health providers to school systems and senior healthcare services.

Connecting with healthcare providers and employers gives the College of Health a ringside seat to understand industry trends and market demand, and to help students prepare for their role as healthcare providers of the future through clinical experiences. By working closely with a variety of healthcare institutions, the College of Health will be able to develop new academic offerings that directly respond to relevant market needs.

"Being able to offer so many medical experiences—in research and lab work, clinical and experiential learning—is the differentiator in our market," notes Dr. Melissa Cole, DNP, RN, ANP-BC, CENP, and John Carroll's Interim Dean of its new College of Health." "We have incredible opportunities in our backyard, thanks to really vested healthcare partners."

Meeting Critical Need

Establishing a College of Health at this moment addresses major labor shortages faced by the healthcare industry nationwide. The Bureau of Labor Statistics expects a shortage of up to 195,400 nurses by 2031; the Association of American Medical Colleges notes that demand for physicians is growing faster than supply, with a total physician shortage of between 37,800 and 124,000 projected by 2034. And it isn't just nurses and doctors who are in short supply: the National Center of Health Workforce Analysis is predicting shortages in allied health professionals like opticians, respiratory therapists, physical therapists, addiction counselors, mental health counselors, and psychologists.

New Programs from Successful Legacies

"Building anything new is one of the most exciting things there is," says Cole. She should know; in November of 2022, Cole helped design John Carroll's undergraduate Nursing program as its Director of Nursing and Strategic Healthcare Initiatives. One year later, she was tapped to lead the launch of a College of Health. "There's no exact playbookyou get to be innovative, create guidelines instead of rules to be broken, and discover how to provide change management." Before coming to John Carroll, Dr. Cole was the Vice President for Integrated Delivery Options at University Hospitals Health System and still currently practices as a Nurse

The College of Health is anchored by the new Bachelor of Science in Nursing program, whose curriculum is based on recently revised quality standards and core competencies from the American Association of Colleges of Nursing, and which offers four certificates to graduates that show proficiency in areas requested by healthcare employers: professional development, self-care, innovation and entrepreneurship, and diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging (DEIB).

In addition to Nursing, the College of Health brings together current undergraduate and graduate programs serving the healthcare space. Undergraduate majors in Exercise Science and Sports Leadership—for students entering the fields of fitness, wellness, exercise science, allied

health, and the sports industrywill fortify Nursing as some of the key undergraduate majors. There will be strong Masters programs in Exercise Science, which will include a customizable curriculum for a range of careers in the medical and sports fields, and Clinical Mental Health Counseling and School Counseling as well. Currently, Counseling is the largest graduate program at JCU and its demand continues to rise.

"Starting the College of Health truly comes out of a long and illustrious history of John Carroll preparing healthcare leaders," says Gunzenhauser. Currently, more than 1,500 John Carroll alumni work in healthcare fields.

Offering practical healthcare experience, John Carroll's Student Health Center and student-run campus EMS service are now a part of the College of Health. Looking ahead, the College of Health plans to expand its program offerings by adding an undergraduate major of Public Health in the fall of 2024, followed by an undergraduate major in Healthcare Administration (fall 2025) and Master of Science in Nursing (fall 2025).

In addition to the programs within the College of Health, collaborative programming with departments within the College of Arts and Sciences and the Boler College of Business will provide courses in healthcare administration, entrepreneurship, and psychology, among others. Integrating healthrelated fields together under the umbrella of a College of Health also provides a method of discernment for students who want to work in healthcare, but may not know their exact path. Students may choose from clinical, research, and business tracks, as well as the experiential learning that is a hallmark of a John Carroll's education.

"The College of Health will continue to evolve and reflect industry trends," notes Cole.

"Healthcare service lines do not work in silos; neither should we. The College of Health will have different specialties-like nursing, exercise science, or counselingbut will collaborate to deliver an incredible experience. The goal of the College of Health is to improve patient outcomes by producing team members able to work in an integrated model."

The Soul of the John **Carroll Difference**

One way the College of Health leverages programs not typically considered inside the healthcare space is the collaboration between the College of Health and the Theology and Religious Studies Department (TRS) at JCU. TRS offers a Hospital Chaplaincy Certificate, boasts distinguished scholars across many faith traditions, and is well-suited to emphasize Catholic teachings as they pertain to medicine while also providing a comprehensive religious education involving other traditions.

"The healthcare ecosystem is a place where people are navigating difficult decisions about quality of life or even end of life; decisions that draw upon a person's values and faith," says Gunzenhauser. "The Theology

and Religious Studies Department provides this perspective of faith and diversity to our students, giving them a sensitivity and awareness of the faiths of the people they encounter as they deliver healthcare."

This approach to faith diversity is an echo of the larger, Jesuit Catholic mission of the College of Health, which includes not only a sensitivity to people's faiths, but an awareness of ethics and moral discernment, and the compassion that sees a person as a complex whole, rather than simply a medical problem.

Extraordinary Investment

Establishing the College of Health also opens the way to significant grant possibilities. Over the past ten years, John Carroll has received numerous grants for its STEMM programs (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics, Medicine; see the grants article on page 10 of this issue for details).

Last year, John Carroll received two substantial grants totaling nearly \$4.5 million to support STEMM students. The Choose Ohio First (COF) grant from the Ohio Department of Higher Education awarded over \$1 million to support the development of STEMM talent focused on patient care in Ohio. COF funds will help 70 College of Health students for four years, providing better access and stronger success rates for underrepresented students interested in careers in healthcare. This is the second COF grant that John Carroll has received; its first successful cohort began in 2017, and had a retention rate over 90% and a near-100% four-year graduation rate.

A grant from the National Science Foundation brings \$2.5 million to John Carroll's INnovation for STEM Pre-Professionals: Identity, Research, and EDucation (INSPIRED) program, providing scholarships for high-potential, low-income students pursuing degrees in STEM.

Both prestigious grant awards will help support a new undergraduate cohort of College of Health scholarship awardees: Servant-leaders Aspiring to be NUrses and Medical Professionals, or SANUM, which is the Latin word for "healthy thing."

HINTERRELIGIOUS UNDERSTANDING



In the Department of Theology & Religious Studies (TRS) at John Carroll University, there is a small plague near the front desk that reads "Be curious, not judgmental." While Ted Lasso might have popularized the famous line, the department is living it out. Decades of investing in curious faculty-scholars dedicated to understanding the rich religious diversity of our world has made a meaningful impact. When violence and division broke out in the Middle East this fall, students, faculty, and staff benefitted from the positive culture of inquiry cultivated by JCU's experience of interreligious engagement.

After Hamas attacked Israel on October 7, 2023, followed by Israel's declaration of war, the world has watched the horror of violence and death unleashed from this long-standing conflict. On college campuses around the country, debate became divisive. Reasoned exchange gave way to violent protests, vandalism, and dehumanizing epithets. However, something different happened at John Carroll University in the weeks and months after October 7th: Jews and Muslims broke bread with each other, students chose dialogue and listening over violent confrontation, and the faculty and staff of TRS displayed true leadership by putting into practice across campus the principles of interreligious understanding they teach in the classroom.

John Carroll has long been committed to interreligious dialogue and in 1966 the Walter & Mary

Tuohy Chair for Interreligious Studies was created by a generous gift from the Tuohy family-the first such chair in ecumenism at a Jesuit university in the United States. By 2023, the Tuohy Endowment had grown to create the Tuohy Center for Interreligious Understanding, thanks to additional University investments in programming and the hiring of distinguished faculty with expertise in various religious traditions

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
Building Bridges

In 2003, the Bediüzzaman Said Nursi Chair in Islamic Studies was created, a position currently held by Zeki Saritoprak, Ph.D., Edward Hahnenberg, Ph.D., who currently chairs TRS, took up the newly established Jack & Mary Jane Breen Chair in Catholic Theology in 2011. In 2022, Noah Bickart, Ph.D., who had previously served as a Tuohy Fellow and visiting professor, became the inaugural Jack, Joseph, and Morton Mandel Chair in Jewish Studies, a position that was created through generous gifts from the Mandel Foundation, the Milton and Tamar Maltz Family Foundation, and Norma Geller '87. Endowed chairs in the three great monotheistic religions have positioned John Carroll to provide world-class religious education in the Jesuit Catholic tradition to all of its students. It also provides leadership to engage in extremely difficult theological discussions during divisive times.

Semiha Topal, Ph.D., the new Program Manager of the Tuohy Center for Interreligious Understanding, likes to stress that JCU does not shy away from religious differences, but acknowledges them in an effort to build bridges and deepen understanding. "We like to fill these gaps with opportunities for dialogue and to create safe spaces for people to be themselves and feel respected," Topal added.

Following the attacks in Israel, Hahnenberg, Bickart, and Saritoprak issued individual and joint statements on the violence. Together with Topal, they discussed what the Tuohy Center could do to support the JCU community, particularly in light of emerging antisemitism and Islamophobia that could potentially threaten JCU students, faculty, and staff. Even within this tight team, the conversations were not easy, but a path forward emerged.

Within a week of the attacks. the Tuohy Center hosted a panel discussion titled "Violence in Sacred Texts: Judaism, Christianity & Islam" that was facilitated by Topal, with Hahnenberg, Saritoprak, and Bickart discussing how each religious



One of the most important responses to the violence in the Middle East was a student-initiated event that was already being planned in the weeks *before* October 7th. The president of JCU's Students for Justice in Palestine (SJP) organization, Gia Hamed, a junior from Westlake, Ohio, wanted to organize an event that highlighted the experience

tradition struggles to interpret their own scriptural texts that seem to condone violence. At an extremely difficult time, Catholics, Jews, Muslims, and others came together to learn more about one other. Saritoprak, who has been at JCU for 22 years, likes to point out that the Carroll community is defined by friendship and a collegial atmosphere. "What is so amazing about Ed and Noah as colleagues and teachers is that they are open-minded people and have immense respect for other religious traditions. Our students notice this and they have followed

of Palestinians. At the same time, Gia was a big believer in bringing people together who think differently.

With help from TRS faculty, Gia decided to focus the event on the personal experiences of those on both sides of the conflict, titling the panel, "My First Trip to Israel/Palestine," Following the attacks on October 7th, Gia was scared and nervous, especially for her friends in SJP. "We suddenly were looked at on campus as the 'face' of Palestinians to everyone and I knew we could not mess this up. I wanted to bring the temperature down and respond differently, in a way that brought people together."

In the polarized aftermath of the attacks, the group decided not to cancel the event, but to model the difficult task of engaging one another constructively in the midst of deep divisions. Sponsored by the Tuohy Center and JCU's Peace, Justice, and Human Rights Program (PJHR), the panel included Jews, Christians, and Muslims, pro-Palestinian activists, and Zionists. Bickart joined Gia alongside Debby Rosenthal, Ph.D., from the English Department, David Shutkin Ph.D., from the Education Department, and Phil Metres, Ph.D., from the English Department and head of PJHR. A packed Donahue Auditorium

A Model for **Building Bridges**

took in a discussion moderated by Dr. Mindy Peden from the Political Science department, in which deeply committed individuals who disagreed with one another shared their experiences and listened to the experiences of others in a way that both illuminated and humanized the conflict.

Bickart likes to highlight one of the core mentalities that exists at JCU. "People are not nameless, faceless adversaries to each other here. We know one another." He and Saritoprak acknowledge that they might be the first Jew or the first Muslim that a JCU student has ever engaged with. It is a responsibility they both take very seriously. "I love teaching about Islam at a Jesuit university," Saritoprak says with glee. One of his proudest moments came a few years ago when a Catholic student taking his class on Islam told him that she now understood the concept of "free will" in her own faith because of a lecture he had given on Islam.

Hahnenberg admits that his own Catholic faith has been strengthened by engaging with Saritoprak, Topal, and Bickart, who are all close friends of his and one another. At the same time, he understands the long-term impact that the University's emphasis on interreligious understanding will have on our students: "By engaging across religious differences, we teach our students the skills they need to engage across all kinds of difference. And if the world needs anything right now, it needs people who know how to engage across the differences that divide us. It needs John Carroll graduates who know how to build bridges that bring people together."

60 years ago, the history of the Class of '64's undergraduate days was written by **Hugh DeSantis** and **Matt MacFadden**. They titled it, "The Ballgame of Life," which wizened, old Doc Carpenter told us awaited beyond graduation. We have each had an adventurous individual six decades and some of that has been chronicled in these pages. Here, let's remember some random class highlights as we prepare to return to University Heights for our diamond anniversary in June.

Freshman year, it was the great snowball fight wherein the men of Pacelli drove the junior/senior members scurrying to the safety of Bernet Hall, our first implementation of ROTC lessons in firepower and maneuver. Junior year commenced two solid years of gridiron superiority with the first of two straight undefeated seasons. Senior year saw the unprecedented, before or since, campuswide, 100% student participation, in the Mock Political Convention in which every campus organization, large and small, participated by representing the 50 states in the rough-and-tumble of determining a presidential candidate at an open party convention.

Fifth Reunion (1969): We returned to watch the Blue Streaks thrash Allegheny at our homecoming football game. The visitors departed dejected, leaving their 12-foot stuffed alligator mascot behind. It was promptly retrieved by **Jim Heavey** and **Bill Smith**. Lashing it to **Frank Kelley's** auto, the gator was driven for display in front of Red and Eddie's Bar, to the merriment of Blue Streak supporters within. The celebration almost ended in tragedy when overly enthusiastic underclass members were



overheard plotting to set the car and trophy aflame. Quick action, however, moved the mascot out of danger to a rear dumpster and there was no subsequent report of arson in the Sunday Plain Dealer.

15th Reunion (1979): Returning revelers, including ringleaders Kathy and **Bob Mirguet**, pulled a last night all-nighter which concluded with the dormitory room doorway of Jim Heavey being so heavily toilet-papered that witnesses compared it to Niagara Falls on a foggy morning.

20th Reunion (1984): **Allyn Adams** announced first year fundraising yielded \$46,000 for the newly created Class of '64 Scholarship Fund, his brainchild. Forty years later, the fund is the second largest in JCU's admissions quiver, gross value well over \$700,000, a huge asset in their mission to attract the most qualified student candidates against stiff competition.

25th Reunion (1989): featured a huge class gift effort, headed by **Tony** Cullichia, yielding a class gift well over \$300,000, one of the largest in Carroll history at that time. The laugh of the weekend came when **AI Rutledge** returned a library book after 25 years to President Michael Lavelle, S.J. Father Mike guffawed loudly and referred Al to Cullichia for an exorbitant fine. That same night Smith approached me for a contribution to the class gift. I walked him to my car, counted out the suggested amount and thought no more of the matter. Ten days later, I received a nice reminder of the Reunion: a personal thank you letter from Father Mike stating "Bill Smith assures me your donation came not only from the bottom of your heart but the bottom of your trunk." I





laughed aloud as it brought back the warm glow of great weekend memories.

40th Reunion (2004): Ginny and Russ Centanni, celebrating Russ' retirement, trailered about a hundred bottles of Idaho wine cross country to Mary and **Tom Leahy**'s Thursday night kick-off party. I estimate they broke about a dozen state laws and a passel of interstate commerce regs. Late that night, after being softened up with several of those Idaho offerings, I agreed to become class scribe, which has been my honor now for twenty years.

One year after our 45th Reunion: In 2010, our five 1964 Hall of Fame football players, Gus McPhie, Dick Koenig, Gordy Premier, Ron Timpanaro, and John Kovach, returned to the annual Hall of Fame dinner. They proudly announced the John W. Ray \$100,000 Sustaining Scholarship that they helped create with the same tenacious leadership skills exhibited on the gridiron.

50th Reunion (2014): We proudly celebrated the groundbreaking ceremony of the Class of '64 Fountain

in front of Pacelli Hall. The fountain. a project inspired by **Allyn Adams**, was constructed that summer and officially dedicated that autumn. Ten of us returned to campus to join Allyn's widow. Susan, in the official dedication by University president Father Robert Niehoff, S.J. The fountain instantly became a campus focal point, a favorite gathering spot that has witnessed important events ranging from marriage proposals to the introduction of goldfish at its reopening in the Spring.

55th Reunion (2019): Fifty celebrants gathered back to University Heights. Visual count determined we had the single largest contingent other than 1969, who were celebrating their 50th. On Saturday we rededicated the Fountain in a joyous, sun-drenched afternoon ceremony. That evening we recognized and honored the very significant campus improvement of the student medical center in the lower level of Dolan Hall, funded by a most generous \$2 million grant from Doctors Kim and Bill Cook. Hopefully these random musings have triggered some fond remembrances of your own.

We'll close with a few lines from the "50th Reunion Anthem" poem from our 2014 Reunion brochure: "Gathering once again to celebrate and renew//Best friendships begun when beer was 3.2// We'll celebrate 60 years with joy, food and drink//Review fond memories gone by in a blink//And excuse tall tales with a nod and a wink." See you this summer.

I started in 1972. 1972 was a banner year; Rev. Fr. Birkenhauer, S.J., President of John Carroll University, asked my Princess Jenny and I to start an Indianapolis Alumni Chapter. Father came for the weekend, JCU paid for a wonderful meal, expenses, and handouts for new chapter members. We had 80 new members. It was SUPER!!!! It ran from June 1972 to June 1982. Jenny and I want you to know how much we love you all, pray every day for you, and greatly miss all of you. We have the deepest love, prayers, sympathies for all our deceased. We sincerely hope the families have moved on. It is ALWAYS SO DIFFICULT and Verv Sad and Emotional. BUT OUR GOD is ALWAYS with us. We have recently lost many friends and relatives in death. I want to SAY A BIG THANK YOU to my dear friend Elizabeth Kelley, speech student of our dear deceased Dr. Vincent Klein, Chairman of the Speech Department 1964 and his co-professor Dr. Joe Miller 1964. Elizabeth wrote to me on one of my columns about Dr. Klein. My Princess Jenny and I want to tell you how much we love you all

and are so grateful for all of you. On September 16, 2023 I found my beloved Princess Jenny unconscious on the kitchen floor, I had 911 paramedics on one hand and doing heart massage and chest compressions with the other. 


Alex Kline has accomplished both personal and professional milestones. In July, he married Taylor Tercek '16 in
